## The PNG Defence Force 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Medal

Mention was made in our December 02 newsletter of this medal and several members notified me that they were interested, having served in PNG.

The medal was introduced by the PNG Government in 1996 to commemorate the end of WW2 in 1946, in recognition of servicemen who had served in PNG.

From what I can ascertain, eligibility includes those who served at any time prior to 1946, and after, during the 50 year period.

The medal is not a regular service issue, such as awards issued by the Australian Government for proclaimed military service, where the recipient's name and regimental number is stamped into the rim of the medal. That is not the case with the above medal.

It is available from Christies in Sydney, at a cost of \$45.60 plus registered mail of \$10.45, although several can be sent in the same package for about the same cost.

Christies will sell the medal to ex-servicemen, providing eligibility is verified by letter sent under our Association letterhead. If anyone is still interested, contact Alex Munro on telephone 82777074 to coordinate details.

## Map Makers of Fortuna

### Book Launch of the History of the Army Survey Regiment.

Written by Valerie Lovejoy, the book was launched before a packed gathering at a civic reception, in the old Bendigo Town Hall, on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> March 03.

The interior of the building has been completely renovated, and was only opened to the public a few days before. The renovations have restored the interior to reflect the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century architecture, but using current materials and practices, retaining the former Victoriana ambience. Very well done I thought, probably costing a mint, but worth it.

Don Swiney set the proceedings going soon after 5pm. First to speak was the Mayor of Bendigo, resplendent in her mayoral robes, talking of the contributions made by the regiment to the city, over the years.

## Book Launch

The next speaker was Clem Sargent, who reminisced on activities within the Corps during the Fortuna period, including many humorous anecdotes. Valerie Lovejoy then spoke at length of the problems encountered, of the people involved, of the characters met and the people interviewed, during the years of research and toil while writing the history.

Both Clem and Valerie spoke very well, easily holding the attention of the gathering. The history committee were also on hand to distribute copies to anyone who had pre-ordered.

After the launch quite a few retired across the road to the old Metropolitan Hotel for drinks before the dinner. The old Met has been turned into an Irish pub, and very congenial too, with a new name I cannot recall.

The post launch dinner was held at the All Seasons International Hotel on McIvor Rd. from 7.30pm on, with over 200 attending.

Formalities for the occasion were kept to a minimum, the main items being the reading of apologies received and a speech by Gordon Lowrie in recognition of the service rendered by the civilian staff at Fortuna over the years, naming notables like Eddie Esposito, Tom Chisholm and many others.

## VALE

Dave Christie Dave died in a Melbourne hospital on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> February 03, at the age of 73yrs. Although suffering from cancer and still undergoing treatment at the time, his death was not attributed entirely to this and was unexpected.

Born in the U.K., Dave's migration to Australia was due largely to his military service. He was originally in the British Army as a National Serviceman, serving in the Middle East, but following that he enlisted in the Australian Regular Army during a recruiting drive in London. Sent to Sydney, he was posted out to Korea the day after arrival, to serve in a mortar company. Returning later to Australia he was posted to the Map Depot in Melbourne, where he joined the Survey Corps, serving for 25 years before retiring as a WO2. During his Corps time he served in 1Fd and 2Fd Svy Sqn, the Survey Regiment and one year in Vietnam.

Dave was always inclined to sporting activities and successfully ran in marathon events, so probably due to his fitness level, his overall physical condition did not fall away. Even a few short days before his death, he was busily engaged under his house putting in electrical wiring for a new air conditioner.

Dave was a proud family man, with three sons, two daughters and thirteen grand children, so will be sadly missed and our condolences are extended to them and his wife Beverly.

Bernard Watson Bernie died peacefully in the Resthaven Nursing Home at Mitcham on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> April 03, aged 86 years.

He was originally from Melbourne, coming to Adelaide with his wife not long after WW2, to settle and raise a family. He was self employed for many years, operating a small printing firm-Wattle Press -in the city.

As a boy he suffered from polio, but was able to overcome his disability, later becoming a first class runner with a Melbourne harriers club, something he was proud to achieve.

During his medical examination to enlist in the Army about 1940, he was rejected with flat feet and therefore unfit for service, until he explained to the Medical Officer that the previous day he had come in at the head of a large field of harriers,

completing a cross-country run of several miles. During his initial training, his unit was honoured with the Freedom of Entry to the City of Bendigo, having marched over from Puckapunyal the previous day. Bernie served in the 2/1<sup>st</sup> Topographical Survey Company in the Middle East, later at Hollandia in the former Dutch New Guinea and at Morotai.

While driving his car last December, he was involved in an accident with another vehicle, which shook him up a great deal and ended his driving days. That was followed some time later with an injury after a fall at his home unit, which combined with a resurgence of his cancer problems, meant that he could no longer fend for himself, so entered the nursing home only a few weeks ago.

He regularly attended our Anzac Day gatherings, and being a keen photographer always arranged photographs, both during the march and afterwards at the reunion. Bernie was also a very supportive RSL member.

A funeral service was held in the Malvern Uniting Church, being very well attended by his many friends, including Bob Love and myself.

I think all members will join with me in extending our condolences to Bernie's family in their sad loss.

#### Brigadier Donald Macdonald AM.

##### Royal Australian Survey Corps 1936-1967.

Brigadier Donald Macdonald passed away peacefully in Sydney on the 8<sup>th</sup> February 2003, just seven weeks short of his 93<sup>rd</sup> birthday.

Don was born at Traralgon in Gippsland on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1910 and grew up in the region. He undertook articles as a surveyor on completion of his education at St Patrick's College, Sale, passing the Victorian Surveyors Board to become a Registered Surveyor in 1931.

He responded to an advertisement for surveyors to join the Australian Survey Corps as topographers, so applied and was appointed a WO2 in the Permanent Military Forces, in January 1936. After initial military and Corps training, he was posted to No 2 Svy Sect in Victoria, there participating in the introduction of air photographs for topographical mapping.

Commissioned in June 1939, he was promoted to Major in 1941, to raise 4 Fd Svy Coy in Western Australia, then transferred in 1942 as OC 3 Fd Svy Coy in Victoria. In January 1943 Don was appointed AD Svy at HQ First Aust Army at Toowoomba, then in 1944 as Asst Theatre Mapping Officer of the Engineer Intelligence Division of the Office of the Chief Engineer SW Pacific Area, including service in the Philippines. In recognition of his war service Don Macdonald was Mentioned in Despatches and awarded the United States Medal of Freedom with Bronze Palm.

In the post-war Army he became AD Svy AHQ in September 1945.

On the retirement of Col. Lawrence Fitzgerald, Don was promoted to Colonel, D Mil Svy at Army HQ.

During his time as D Mil Svy the Corps was heavily involved in the completion of the 1.250 000 map coverage of Australia and the following 1.100 000 mapping of Australia and PNG. It was a period of great expansion and technical change, including the raising of 1 Topo Svy Tp of which A Sect was to serve in Vietnam.

Colonel Macdonald ably represented Australia at Conferences of Commonwealth Survey Officers and Military Survey Conferences in the UK, also meetings of the Geographic Committee of SEATO.

He was promoted Brigadier on his retirement in March 1967 and was appointed as the first Colonel Commandant of the Corps later in the year, holding the position until 1973.

Following his retirement from the Army he accepted a position as Executive Officer to the Commonwealth Surveyor-General in the Australian Survey Office in Canberra, until 1975.

As a member of the Institute of Surveyors, he was President of the Victorian Division in 1953, President of the Canberra Division in 1965, National President in 1967 and received the Medal of the Institute of Surveyors Australia in 1972. In 1978 he was appointed a Member in the General Division of the Order of Australia, for his exceptional service to land surveying.

Don Macdonald was a gregarious and happy man and will be sadly missed by all who knew him and served with him.

A Requiem Mass was held for Don at the Sacred Heart Church, Mosman, on 13<sup>th</sup> February 2003, followed by burial at North Sydney Cemetery beside his beloved wife, Lucy. ~~~~~
