The Director

Colonel D.G. (Don) Swiney, MBE was appointed Director of Survey (Army) on 4 November 1988. He is a Western Australian by birth and enlisted into the Australian Regular Army in 1959. After training as a topographical surveyor at the School of Military Survey, at Balcombe in Victoria, he was posted to the then AHQ Survey Regiment at Bendigo. He was initially involved in the 1:250 000 scale mapping programme and was at the Maralinga Atomic Range when he was selected for officer training at the Officer Cadet School, Portsea in 1963.

He graduated as a Second Lieutenant into the Royal Australian Engineers where, after engineer officer training, he had a series of postings involving him in road construction projects in Papua New Guinea and Sabah Malaysia, engineer staff postings and as a staff officer on the headquarters of the Australian Task Force in Vietnam.

He transferred back to the Royal Australian Survey Corps and completed a degree in surveying at the Western Australian Institute of Technology in 1975. Command of a field survey squadron operating in Irian Jaya, Indonesia followed and he then returned to the Army Survey Regiment, this time as Second-in-Command. He was appointed as the senior survey staff officer at Headquarters Land Command in Sydney and returned for the final time to the Army Survey Regiment as the Commanding Officer. In 1988 he was a student at the Joint Services Staff College prior to taking up his current appointment.

Colonel Swiney saw war service in Sabah during confrontation and in South Vietnam. He was made a member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) as a result of his service in Irian Jaya and is a member of the Institution of Surveyors. He is married with 3 grown up children.

The Royal Australian Survey Corps

After Federation, the need for national map coverage was recognised for defence and development purposes. In 1907 a survey section was formed as part of the Australian Intelligence Corps, a corps of the Citizen Military Forces. Shortly afterwards it was realised that this task could not be achieved on a part time basis. Colonel W. T. Bridges approached the British War Office for assistance and, as a result, on 11 April 1910, a corporal and three sapper Royal Engineer Topographers arrived in Melbourne, on secondment to the Australian Military Forces for two years. The Survey Section, Royal Australian Engineers, was formed on 16 April 1910 and given responsibility for mapping and plans. A further two sappers joined the Section from England on 6 May 1912, together with a number of locally enlisted personnel.

On 1 July 1915, by an Executive Order issued by the Governor-General, the Australian Survey Corps was raised as a corps of the Permanent Military Forces. A total of 19 all ranks were transferred from the Survey Section, Royal Australian Engineers, to the new Corps, with their present ranks.

Twelve members of the Australian Survey Corps served with the British military survey units in France, Belgium, Egypt and Palestine. Five of those members served as part of the Survey Section at the Australian Corps Headquarters in France.

With the return to Australia of the AIF in 1919, the Australian Survey Corps resumed the mapping of Australia. The Corps remained essentially a small organisation of 14 all ranks, until 1935. During this period many new technological ideas were introduced by the Survey Corps, including photogrammetry, mathematical adjustments and an Australia wide geodetic base.

With the declaration of World War II the Survey Corps expanded rapidly, reaching a peak of more than 1700 all ranks in August 1945, with 862 serving overseas. During World War II the Corps supported Australian troops in such theatres of war as New Guinea, Dutch New Guinea, New Britain, New Ireland, Bougainville, Borneo, the Philippines and the Middle East. The Corps produced maps in all these theatres of operations as well as providing emergency map coverage of Australia.

On 31 December 1948 the Australian Survey Corps was granted the title 'Royal' and soon after designed the Corps Crest and the hat badge. It also adopted the motto 'Videre Parare Est' - 'To See is to Prepare' and the marching song - 'Wandering the Kings Highway'.

After the war, the Corps' strength was reduced to 430. The Corps continued to map Australia with early emphasis on the Snowy Mountain Diversion Scheme and the Long Range Weapons Establishment at Woomera. Many innovations were adopted by the Corps in the post war years, including the metric scale, scribing, the use of helicopters, electronic distance measuring devices, laser height measurement, stereographic plotters, and finally, in the 1980's, computer assisted cartography and satellite tracking equipment.

The Royal Australian Survey Corps provided cartographic support to the Australian Task Force in Vietnam, arriving there on 10 June 1966, and remaining until the withdrawal of Australian troops in 1972. Through the auspices of the Defence Cooperation Programme, the Corps has also given support to many of our near neighbours including Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, Fiji and Samoa.

Since the inception of a military mapping organisation in Australia in 1907, there have been many changes in the surveying and mapping profession. The Royal Australian Survey Corps has always been and remains a leader in the development of new technology and is proud of the contribution it has been able to make to the Australian community.

Commanding Officer



Commanding Officer Army Survey Regiment Lieutenant Colonel R. van den Tol

Lieutenant Colonel R. (Rene) van den Tol graduated from the Royal Military College, Duntroon in December 1974 after completing a Diploma of Military Studies in Civil Engineering. After a period of regimental training as a Troop Commander with the Fourth Cavalry Regiment, Enoggera, he transferred to the Royal Australian Survey Corps in December 1976, taking up an appointment as a Troop Commander at the Army Survey Regiment, Bendigo. He undertook civil schooling at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology in 1978-79 graduating as a Bachelor of Applied Science in Surveying.

A posting to Adelaide followed in January 1980 as Second-in-Command and subsequently Officer Commanding 4 Field Survey Squadron. During this period Lieutenant Colonel van den Tol was involved in a number of major survey operations in both South Australia and the Northern Territory.

He completed the Army Staff Course at the Royal Military College of Science, United Kingdom in 1983, and was then posted to Canberra as a Project Officer in Materiel Branch where his major responsibility lay in coordinating the installation of the Automap 2 computer assisted mapping facility. From there Lieutenant Colonel van den Tol was posted to the Army Survey Regiment as the Operations Officer and returned to Canberra in June 1987 to join the operations staff in the Directorate of Survey-Army. He was promoted Lieutenant Colonel in November 1987 and appointed Staff Officer Grade One - Operations in the Directorate.

In December 1989 he was appointed Commanding Officer, Army Survey Regiment. He is a member of the Institution of Surveyors, Australia, is married with two children and is currently studying for a Masters Degree in Business Administration.

The Army Survey Regiment

In 1911, a sub-section of the Survey Section, Royal Australian Engineers was established in Melbourne. When the members of the Australian Survey Corps returned from Europe in 1919, this sub-section was reorganised to form a survey sub-section and a draughting sub-section. With the increase in the strength of the Corps in 1938 the draughting sub-section was expanded and renamed "Cartographic Section Army Headquarters". In January 1940 the Cartographic Section was moved out of Victoria Barracks, Melbourne into Mitchell House in the heart of the city. The Cartographic Section was increased in strength to form the Army Headquarters Cartographic Company on 1 February 1941. At that time all preparation for printing and the printing of maps was undertaken by civilian firms. This situation became untenable and on 26 May 1941 a photographic/lithographic section was formed, as part of the Cartographic Company, and was located in Little Latrobe St Melbourne. The expanded Company was renamed the Land Headquarters Cartographic Company.

In January 1942, the Officer Commanding the Company, Major W.M. Sarll, was directed to find a more suitable location for the unit, north of the dividing range and away from the areas of military concentration at Puckapunyal and Albury/Wodonga. He inspected possible sites in Keilor and Kyneton, finally arriving in Bendigo. That evening in the City Family Hotel, a local resident suggested he should look at "Fortuna", the one time mansion of George Lansell - the 'Quartz King'. The following day he paid sixpence for the conducted tour of the mansion and immediately appreciated that it was the ideal home for his unit.

The LHQ Cartographic Company moved into Fortuna to take up permanent residence on 11 June 1942. The photographic/lithographic plant was installed in the old stamping battery, while the cartographic sections were installed in the old mansion. During World War II the Cartographic Company produced 834 maps and had printed 20 million maps and charts with 76 million press runs. After the war the Cartographic Company remained at Fortuna and was renamed Army Headquarters Cartographic Company.

The Southern Command Field Survey Section located at Albert Park Barracks, Melbourne, was relocated to Bendigo in 1955 and the AHQ Cartographic Company was granted 'Regiment' status and renamed AHQ Survey Regiment. The Regiment was now capable of performing all the functions involved in the production of maps and charts - from original survey to final reproduction.

On 14 June 1970 the City of Bendigo, represented by the Mayor, Councillor J.C.M. Jeffrey, conferred upon the AHQ Survey Regiment the privilege, honour and distinction of the 'Freedom of Entry' into the City of Bendigo. This privilege has been exercised on three occasions since - in 1977, 1980 and 1985.

In 1973 the Regiment was renamed 'Army Survey Regiment'. Computer Assisted Cartography was introduced to the Regiment in 1976 with Automap I and was replaced by Automap II in 1984.

During the past 48 years most officers and men of the Royal Australian Survey Corps have served with the Regiment at Fortuna. In doing so they have identified themselves with the City of Bendigo by their participation in community life and membership of churches, educational and sporting organisations and service clubs.

The Deed of the Freedom of Entry is displayed in the entrance hall of Fortuna.

Freedom of Entry

The exercise of Freedom of Entry to a city is an ancient ceremony dating back to the Middle Ages when European cities were walled and often set at cross-roads. Moving armies needed to pass through the cities and relied upon them for provisions. It was important to know whether a city was friendly or not and so grew the custom of a city conferring Freedom of Entry on bodies of troops which it supported. This particular custom was especially applicable to London where only the Regiments which have descended from the original city; the Buffs, the Royal Fusiliers, the 2nd Battalion of the Gloucesters and the 3rd Battalion of the Grenadier Guards are allowed to march through the city with swords drawn and bayonets fixed and no troops may cross the boundary without the Lord Mayor's permission.

Out of these traditions has grown the ceremony of modern times. Cities no longer train their own troops, but by both association and name, links have been forged between army units and the cities in which they are stationed.

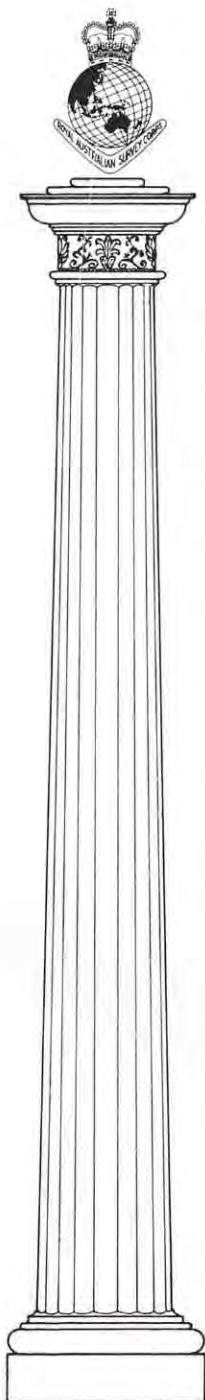

The Parade

In recent years the Army Survey Regiment has conducted a "Corps Day Parade" on the parade ground of "Fortuna" in celebration of the Anniversary of the formation of Royal Australian Survey Corps on 1 July 1915. It has become traditional every fifth year for the Regiment to parade on the Queen Elizabeth Oval and to exercise its right of freedom of entry to the City of Bendigo, thus providing an opportunity to celebrate "Corps Day" and to salute the citizens of Bendigo. This year is particularly significant as it marks the 75th Anniversary of the formation of the Royal Australian Survey Corps. The following is the sequence of events:

The Regiment

The four squadrons of the Regiment and the RAAF Central Band form up in the car park at the southern end of the Queen Elizabeth Oval under command of their respective Squadron Sergeant Major and the Drum Major.

Markers are posted by the Regimental Sergeant Major (RSM).

The squadrons and the band march onto the Queen Elizabeth Oval and form up in-line.

The RSM takes command of the parade and the dressing is carried out to the beats of the drum corps. Whilst the RSM is preparing the parade for inspection, the Officers form up in a single rank along the front edge of the parade ground covering off their respective squadrons.

The RSM hands over to the Adjutant (ADJT) who orders the Regiment to fix bayonets. The Officers and Warrant Officers Class One draw swords at the same time.

The ADJT hands over to the Second in Command (2IC) who posts the Officers.

The Officers salute the 2IC and march to their squadron positions. When in position the Officers about turn to the base drum.

The 2IC hands over to the Commanding Officer who takes command of the Regiment.

The Parade Host is received on parade and is given a General Salute by the Regiment.

The Parade Host receives the Official Guests.

The Mayor of the City of Bendigo is received on parade and is escorted to the dais by the Parade Host. The Mayor is given a General Salute by the Regiment.

The CO moves forward to the dais and invites the Mayor to inspect the parade.

The Mayor, accompanied by the CO, Parade Host and the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) inspects the Regiment.

Prayers for the Regiment and the City of Bendigo are offered by the Regiment's Chaplains.

The Mayor leaves the parade and goes to the saluting dais outside the Memorial Hall. On leaving, the Mayor is given a General Salute by the Regiment.

The Official Guests leave and go to the saluting point outside the Memorial Hall. On leaving, they are saluted by the Parade Host.

The Parade Host leaves and goes to the saluting dais outside the Memorial Hall. On leaving he is given a General Salute by the Regiment.

The Regiment marches off the QEO in the order, Command Group, Headquarters Squadron, Band, Air Survey Squadron, Cartographic Squadron and Lithographic Squadron.

The Regiment marches down View Street and is challenged at Charing Cross by the City Marshall. The Regiment halts and the CO responds to the challenge. The Regiment is then allowed to proceed.

The Regiment proceeds into Pall Mall and salutes the Mayor on the dais outside the Memorial Hall.

The Regiment continues along Pall Mall and into Bridge Street and Farmers Lane for dispersal.
